#### Last week of trial

Crunch time – do we continue this initative from Cherie Pie and Bill??? We need feedback please. If we all added our name to roster for a few hours **once a year** we would have the roster covered! Thanks must go to those who just popped in to help or offered/were begged to help. It would not have worked without you.

How wonderful it would be to continue this "café' and develop the garden to table theme within the education framework. Excite the children with their involvement in the process and give the teachers a small break! This however takes a much more "considered" view rather than purely a tuckshop process and a lot more discussion with teachers and parents maybe!

I do think the 'café' is sustainable enough to pay someone to continue the process – especially now a few of the "essentials" have been bought. **Anyone keen or even more sustainably a team?** It is a frustrating kitchen to work in still ... but it is getting easier. I think it was designed to make only big pots of curry in!

The 'cafe' has the capacity to contribute to ongoing costs for the garden and class based activities [the 2013 class 3 can build one!]—but not really enough fundraising for the "kindy building fund"—although this could be a future goal. The biodynamic garden so embedded in Steiner philosophy—was developed by a volunteer parent many years ago. He now runs his own farm. Although the science of biodynamic gardening is too much for my scientist brain!—the principles behind gardening organically [healthy soil—grows healthy product] are benificial. I reflected this week on the privilege I have felt to be able to "donate" my time to starting this project despite, like all of us, so many other demands on my time. Luckily I am between jobs so the timing was great except for a few weeks. It has been much bigger than I expected [part of that has been the research and the accounting] but has also brought many unexpected joys - which I will treasure. Such is the life of a volunteer – poor in \$ but rich in other ways! I can see my dad smiling and his motto – you always get back more than you give ..., although it often comes in unexpected ways. So to those who have been able to pop in and help – my blessings and I know you have been enriched as well. Cleaning up at the end I've never enjoyed as I've thought of the mess in my own house and the garden that needs attention! Need a roster system for that one!

It has really made me reflect on the "value" of our school and the kids and teachers that bless and support it. I have loved the support of "my" class teacher and others who have been so appreciative [thanks Nick], I have **enjoyed** the company of some parents and sometimes their little kids but I've also witnessed the daily rhythm of the school on a Friday, the smiling faces receiving lunch [those who are fussy and those who aren't!], the paparazzi from class 3 who interviewed us as part of their play time, the amazingly fresh garlic to cook with, the joy of discovering new recipes and using such fresh local ingredients. The order that had "silverbeet crayons" still makes be chuckle (a tired Michelle!).

I do understand that not everyone shares my passion for fresh organic local food and so have been prepared to use this and my past catering experience to start the ball rolling! Thank you to those who have been prepared to "give it a go" for whatever reason. When I started researching "menu's for school tuckshops - I was horrified. So much was written about obesity epidemic rather than "good healthy food" – something this school encourages. I was influenced by the early childhood framework here and the sharing of good food in kindy [Suzanna did spoil us and I was lucky enough to volunteer in her classes too]. I 've tried to offer many choices and a variety of items as part of the trial process although I believe this confused a few! I've been amazed how many vegetarian dishes I've been able to make with silverbeet and there is still more! My partner dislikes silverbeet so we only grow it for our chooks! It did however make me realize how hard it is to do 100% local meal – and to find a recipe that matched the garden produce, that kids would enjoy and the kitchen could handle. I still haven't made a potato and silverbeet curry or burgers!! We really need to grow potato's!

Many more special moments have been the interactions with my own daughter who constantly gave me support and ideas and even gave me the go ahead for asparagus sushi – despite not really liking asparagus [which is good as there is only room for one person to eat our crop of asparagus in our house I say!!] – and whose concept of money and sums has grown having to count all the coins after school on a Friday and covert them to notes! Her money box has grown! I've always disliked the cashiering sides of business but this time it has had a different slant!

The purpose of an event is to give people an opportunity to get out into nature, practise their spotlighting skills looking for wildlife and learn about the threats that face our native wildlife. - Tuesday 9 October 6.00pm, Watarrka National Park
- Saturday 13 October, 6.30pm-8.00pm, Ormiston Gorge, MacDonnell Ranges National Park


